President's Message

Three years have passed since our truly excellent 3rd International Weed Science Congress in Brazil. Please make plans to attend the 4th IWSC next year (June 19-25) in Durban, South Africa. A more detailed description of the social and scientific program for the meeting can be found in this newsletter. We intend to have a diverse program that will have several topics interest for everyone. Furthermore, if you have not been to South Africa, I think that you will find the experience interesting and delightful, as both of my recent trips have been.

I realize that, for many of you, this is a long journey, travel budgets have been cut, and there is a heightened level of concern about air travel. Other meetings, such as the 15th International Plant Protection Congress have had to be rescheduled because of SARS (it has been rescheduled for May 11-15, 2004). Asian participants from SAR-affected countries did not attend the recent 3rd Pan Pacific Conference on Pesticide Science. Times are very tough for the plant protection industry, so there are fewer industry participants and less funding from industry for conferences and congresses. For these and/or other reasons, attendance at many major scientific meetings has atrophied in recent years. This is extremely unfortunate for science and for scientists, since these meetings provide valuable opportunities to meet new and old collaborators, to see what the state of the art is worldwide, to discuss your work with a wide audience, and to meet, see and hear scientists that you would otherwise never have an opportunity to know.

Furthermore, the IWSS meets only every four years, and to miss this meeting would, for many of

you, puts an eight year or more gap in your attendance at an IWSS meeting. The program promises to be truly outstanding.

Also, I think that you will find South Africa a great place to visit. South Africa is a very stable country with excellent infrastructure. You will find the people friendly, the prices very reasonable, and the many sightseeing opportunities. For those with a botanical bent (and all weed scientists should have this), South Africa is a treasure trove of botanical wonders. From observing the tourists in South Africa, it seems that Europeans are more aware of these things than others. Also, our venue has been honored as the top convention site in Africa. Many other international societies have had very successful meetings there.

From The Scientific Program Committee of the 4th IWS Congress

The scientific program of the 4th IWSC in Durban, South Africa is based on 26 topics that cover the most relevant aspects of modern weed science. Each "Congress Day" will begin with a 'Keynote Presentation' followed by concurrent sessions, Poster session and Poster Discussions.

Leading scientists from all over the world were nominated as 'Organizers' and 'Moderators' (see table that follows) and were asked to organize the sessions. Graduate Student Awards To Attend IWS Congress: A Competition

The IWSS has decided to encourage the participation of young weed scientists (M.S. and Ph.D. students) to the coming IWSC in Durban, by providing up to 6 scholarships that will cover registration fees, accommodation, and part of the travel expenses. The Graduate Student Awards Committee (Prof J. Streibig, Chairman, Dr. Phil Banks and Prof. B. Rubin) will select the awardees according to the following criteria:

1. The candidate must be enrolled as M.S. or Ph.D. student pursuing a degree related to WEED SCIENCE as of December 20, 2003.

2. Submission should be in the form of up to a 5-page manuscript including tables, figures and photos (PDF file - font 12, 1.5 space and 3 cm margin throughout), with abstract, introduction, materials and methods, results, and discussion. Deadline for submission is December 20, 2003.

3. Submissions will be appraised based on the following merits: quality of research, novelty, contribution to the discipline of Weed Science and to the society.

4. Submissions should include a letter of commitment from the major professor or institution to provide additional travel support if the student should receive the award from IWSS.

Criteria for the award are as follows:

a. The nominee must have been active in Weed Science but need not be a member of IWSS.

b. Nominations must be made by a member of IWSS or a member of an affiliated society.

c. The nominating letter and supporting material (including a complete curriculum vitae, publication record, employment history, current position, academic credentials, other awards and honors, and a statement of justification) must explain in general and in specific terms the nominee's outstanding contributions to international weed science.

d. The nominee must have been contributed to or been active in international weed science for at least 10 years.

e. Members of the awards committee are not eligible to receive the award.

f. No more than two awards will be given.

g. The award will be given only when a suitable candidate(s) has been identified. No award will be given when there is only one nominee.

Nominees are to be judged by the Immediate Past-President, President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer, Chair of the awards committee, and any other member designated by the President. Winners are decided by majority vote and will be announced at the business meeting of the Society at the 4th IWSC in Durban.

Weed Science Events and Workshops

19th Asian-Pacific Weed Science Society Conference in Manila

The 19th APWSS Conference was held in Manila, Philippines during 17-21 March 2003. The Conference was hosted by the Weed Science Society of Philippines, with the theme Weed Science, Agricultural Sustainability and GMOs. Despite a threat of war in Iraq and the SARS crisis just raising its nasty head, some 200 delegates from 20 countries participated in this Conference. The largest contingent was from Japan (49) followed by South Korea (28) and Australia (11).

The Conference included 85 papers and 44 posters on varying topics. Several interesting ideas were presented on the subject of technology transfer in the Asian-Pacific region and weed management at the small farm level. Harmonizing herbicide regulations in the Asian-pacific region was raised as a possibility in the foreseeable future. The special symposium on GMOs was well attended and included several informative and interesting presentations. An interesting field trip to Taal volcano, Lumban and the International Rice Research Institute was organized mid week during the Conference. The Executive Committee meeting agenda included discussions on the possibility of holding Joint Symposia with WSSA at the Feb 2005 meeting in Hawaii.

The 20th APWSS Conference is scheduled for November 2005 in Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam.

National Seminar on Alien Invasive Weeds Held in India

A three-day "National Seminar on Alien Invasive Weeds in India" was organized by National Research Centre for Weed Science at Assam Agricultural University, Jorhat form 27 – 29 April, 2003. Fourteen lead papers were presented during the seminar on the agro-biology and management of some important alien invasive weeds occurring in the country. A policy paper stressing the necessity for the development of a strategy and action plan at National level for the prevention and management of alien invasive weeds was also discussed. About 60 posters were displayed covering different aspects of alien invasive weeds. About 65 delegates from all over India participated in the deliberations. As an awareness raising exercise, specially prepared posters on some problem weeds viz., Parthenium hysterophorus, Lantana camara, Eichhornia crassipes, Ipomoea Mikania micrantha. carnea. Ageratum houstonianum, Chromolaena odorata and Mimosa rubicaulis were distributed to the participants. The delegates were also taken around the famous Kaziranga National Park of Assam, home for the endangered single horned rhinoceros. The park is severely infested by an invasive alien weed Mimosa spp. At the end a unanimous resolution was passed by all the participants requesting the immediate intervention of the policy makers to contain the damage being caused by these green invaders to the agriculture and environment.
